Modern archaeologists have discovered evidence of permanent indigenous settlements in and around the Morgantown area going back thousands of years before Europeans colonists arrived. The state also served as a hunting ground for Cherokee, Deleware, Irolquois, Mingo, , and Shawnee living outside West Virginias current borders. Native populations decreased with the advance of Europeans settler colonists and their introduction of resource / extraction economies and Western agricultural practices, which often left forests wilderness clearcut and local ecologies no longer sustainable for them, as well as the introduction of foreign pathogens like smallpox.

Greetings from the Chair: Dear Friends,

Since my last message to you, a year ago, much has changed. With the Morgantown History Museum - and with me personally.

The Pandemic that we have managed to pull-through has created new and creative ways of operating.

Case-in-point: I wrote a grant to Your Community Foundation for funding to create 'The Monongahela People' exhibit and opening reception. The grant was funded. We were going to have the events in the Spring of 2021, but unfortunately the Pandemic was still prominent enough to prevent our inside event. But, we had to think of something! Thus, creative juices started to flow - Yes, we'll have the exhibit in abbeviated form - as a preview - OUTSIDE! We rented the city SkyRock Pavillion, at the top of Dorsey's Knob, which has roots in the 'Monongahela People' Native tradition. Although the weather had been mild up until our preview - Earth Day 2021that day was frigid, with high winds and snow! I thought we would freeze to death. The elevation of SkyRock, at 1,398 feet helped to make it extremely uncomfortable. We toughed it out and stayed the day. Thus, I guess you can surmise from this experience - you will do anything in the name of history.

Change also comes in ways beyond operation schedules and freezing in icy outside displays. Sometimes changes come personally. I have been contemplating giving up the directorship position at the Morgantown History Museum for awhile now. Circumstances that have occured more recently, have made me make that big change in my life. I will be leaving the museum directorship on July 1, 2021. This was a extremely difficult decision for me to make. Why? Because I started the museum effort 26 years ago. The early organization was known as 'Riverfront Museums, Inc.' - we started up in the mid-1990s and had our tiny exhibit space in the old Seneca Glass building. That organization was taken under the wing of the City of Morgantown in 2005, when they voted to organize a city museum commission. I was asked to lead this effort. We had our first commission meeting in August of 2005; I found a small operating space by December of 2005; we found salvaged used office furniture and created a small exhibit by June of 2006. We opened to the public on WV Day, June 2006. We had a fiddler friend Mark Crabtree play WV Civil War tunes on his fiddle and had a large WV shaped birthday cake for refeshment. It was a very nice first event.

Things rapidly moved along and by December of 2011 we had a new and much larger operating space- and were chosen to be one of the six organizations to be venues for the Smithsonian exhibit 'The Way We Worked' - it was a dream come true for me!

Thanks for all of the wonderful assistance my friends - you have helped me develop a museum to be proud of - indeed! Take care. **Pamela A. Ball, Founder**



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






Paintings shown above are hanging in the museum for the public to view. They are the works of Sally McClain, former art teacher at Morgantown High School and Lydia Keiser.


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


Above are some of the items we have had donated over the years from the general public. Included: the photographic collection by Frank Scafella and Sue Amos of the building construction going on in the Wharf district.

7. Glass plate photographic negative, view across Falling Run including Woodburn Circle, shot from the bottom of Stewart St. 8" x 10" William Ramsey, photographer, Morgantown, ca.1890-1900. 8' x 10', nickel-plated frame w/ hanging rings.

8. Paper, Sons of the Revolution membership application, Feb. 22,1936, by William Emmet Morgan Mockler, whose ancestor fought in two battles of the American Revolution. Includes genealogy of Price family of Mon. County.

9. Leather, buggy whip, two-toned brown, braided, 6' long, w/wrist strap. Found in the house built by the late Gans Ridgeway in Uffington, WV. He was known for owning horses, as were others in that area.

11. Paper, Real Photographic Postcard, B & W, young man with baseball bat. Identified on back as Mose Darst, aged 19 in 1914, Morgantown attorney, 1895-1936.
